
## **Giving Outdoor Adventures a Shot**





When the mother wolf spotted me, she sat up. I released her pups, and they raced to her. "What's next?" I wondered. The mother wolf was clearly suffering as she 15 whimpered in pain. Yet each time, I moved in her direction, a menacing growl rumbled in her throat. She needed food. I had to find her something to eat. Picking up my bag, I hiked towards the closest river and spotted the carcass of a deer on the snowbank. I took one of its legs and left the rest in nature's refrigerator. Carrying the meat back to the wolf, I whispered in a soothing tone, "Here's your dinner. But only if you stop growling at me." Next, I tossed it in her direction. She sniffed at it and then gobbled it up.

That night, I made a makeshift shelter under a tree not far away from the wolf family and was soon fast asleep. The unexpected happened the next morning. I was awakened by four fluffy, fearless bundles sniffing at my face. Over the next few days, I attempted to get close to her. I talked gently to her, threw her more meat and played with 25 her young.
