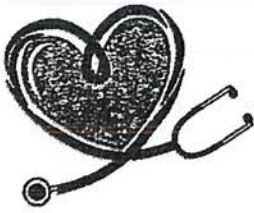

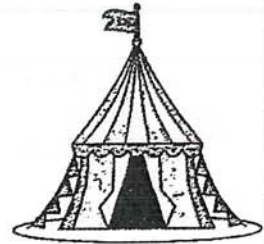

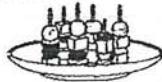

Section I: Comprehension (Open-ended) 20 marks

It was almost pitch black when we set off into the forests of Tengah at 1.30 a.m. My chatty colleague and I decided to join a local durian-picking group. It was something we wanted to do before retiring in a few months' time after teaching for more than 20 years.

Early morning mists shrouded the area as we began our tour to find out if the durians there were ripe and ready for harvest. We were there at that time not because we were nocturnal creatures but because most durians were said to fall from trees then. Squelching through the mud in a single file, I turned around and laughed at my colleague who had readied himself for battle. Armed with a head lamp and a yellow construction helmet to protect his head against the dangers of falling fruits, he looked hilarious. He looked so different without his usual tailored black suit.

The forests made its disdain for intruders clear. Thorny vegetation scratched our limbs and fiery ants bit our legs as we made our way, slowly deeper in the foliage. As the durian season rolls around at mid-year and year-end, some Singaporeans prefer the adventure of heading into the jungle for their durian fix instead of haggling over prices at durian stalls.

As we made our way in, the group leader paused suddenly and asked us if we had heard a durian fall. "No," the clueless me replied. I was more preoccupied with keeping my footing amid the dense undergrowth and suppressing the urge to tear off the shoes from my feet which were being ravaged by ants. I really envied my colleague who could put up with the discomfort without any complaint. After a few minutes of searching the ground for the fallen durian with a powerful torch, the group leader located **it**. In disappointment, I noted that a part of its husk had been hollowed out.

"Squirrels have gotten to it as **they** know how to pick the best durians. How do you tell that this durian has just fallen? Look at its fresh white stem that has not turned brown," the group leader briefed us. **He** also explained that many of the durian trees were planted several years ago by residents living in kampongs while National Parks Board (NParks) plants durian trees in our parks for educational purposes.

I later learnt that although NParks itself did not harvest the fruit of trees, members of the public were not allowed to pluck, collect or keep fruits such as durians found in parks, nature reserves and along roads in NParks-managed areas. Upon hearing that, I told myself this would be my first and last durian hunt. My colleague decided not to keep any durian in order not to break any law.

Towards the end of our hike, I finally heard the soft whooshing and then thumping sound of a durian landing on the forest floor. As we searched furiously around a nearby tree, the distinctive aroma of a freshly dropped durian tempted us. The search, however, was "fruitless" and we decided to wrap it up at 3 a.m. On the way out, I hauled back the huge 2 kg durian I picked up earlier that had been partially eaten by animals.

The next day, my family members gamely helped me to chop open the fruit. Unfortunately, its flesh was white and unripe so it tasted unpalatable. **So much for trusting the squirrels to pick the best durians.**

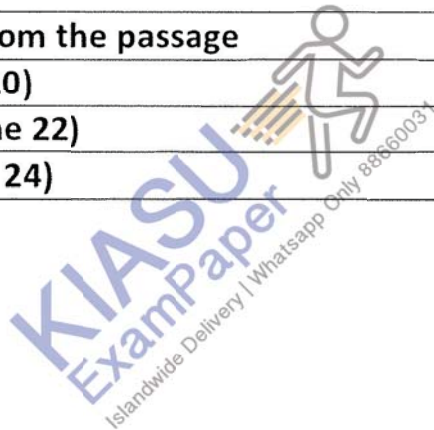
